The flight by Wiens was spectacular: chicken dinner was served in the air, above the Arctic Circle, caribou were sighted and circled during the flight through the Anaktuvuk Pass, and the Will Rogers and Wiley Post Monument was circled and photographed. No doubt Captain Hausler's successful landing at Barrow in a typical Arctic fog resulted in the passengers' acute appreciation of the superb performance of the Alaskan pilot.

FT. YUKON-CIRCLE HOT SPRINGS' FLIGHT: Forty busy summer school students and faculty took an eight-hour reprieve from their books on the evening of July 24 to visit via Alaska Airlines the Indian village of Ft. Yukon above the Arctic Circle and Circle Hot Springs.

MR. HOWARD MATTHEWS TO VISIT CAMPUS:

Mr. Howard Matthews of the Territorial Department of Education will be on campus during the week of July 28 through August 1. For the past year, Mr. Matthews has

been serving as a member of the Coordinating Committee for a research project on Alaska Native Education which is being conducted by the University of Alaska and financed by the United States Office of Education. During his visit to the University, Mr. Matthews will attend sessions of a workshop being held at the University in which selected graduate students, who are also experienced Alaskan educators, are interpreting and evaluating data collected which pertains to native education in the Territory. GIFT OF ELEMENTARY TEXTBOOKS:

Forty-one copies of elementary textbooks which were published, on the average, 100 years ago have been donated to the University of Alaska department of education, according to Dr. William K. Keller, department head. The oldest book in the collection, which includes many McGuffey readers, was published in 1826.

The books were donated by Warren I. Tiffany, education specialist with the Bureau of Indian Affairs at Nome. He acquired the books through the departmental library in Washington, D. C.

The collection also contains old arithmetic, geography, and history books, Dr. Keller said. The copies have been turned over to the University Library.

TELEVISION PROGRAMS:

"YOU AND THE STATE OF ALASKA: " Dr. Donald R. Moberg, head of the department of History and Political Science at the University of Alaska, will be the principal commentator in a series of six one-half hour panel-type television programs entitled "You and the State of Alaska." Prof. Charles Keim, associate professor of journalism, will serve as moderator.

The purpose of the programs is to acquaint citizens with an analysis of future state government, emphasizing the role of responsible citizenship. The series will run from July 30 through August 11. The programs are designed as informative, objective discussions interpreting various phases of state government. The University will participate with station KTVF in presenting the programs as a public service.

It is hoped that persons having specific questions regarding state government and the constitution will mail these questions to: Ross L. Miller, Director of Information, Box 1003, College. Dr. Moberg and program panelists will attempt to answer questions within general governmental areas.

The first program, which comes after the close of filing for candidates, will deal with the upcoming election, election districts, transitional articles of the constitution, and the main considerations of the first state legislature.

Subsequent programs will cover legislature and administrative setup, the executive branch of government, powers of the Governor and provisions for safeguards against dictatorial power, judicial branch, local borough and city government, services required by citizens and how these services are to be paid for, and other questions sent in by the viewing audience.

Plans call for taping the programs for re-distribution to radio stations.
