

STUDY OPPORTUNITIES

Announcements of scholarships, fellowships, grants and other competitions are received and kept on file by the Dean of Women. Summaries of these announcements (see below) are distributed periodically to students and staff members. Detailed information about specific study opportunities will be made available to interested persons upon request.

AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF UNIVERSITY WOMEN -- Educational Foundation

Forty fellowships with stipends from \$2000 to \$5000. Open to women of the United States: (1) who hold the doctorate, or (2) who will have fulfilled all requirements for the doctorate, except the dissertation, by the time fellowship year begins, or (3) who have attained professional recognition. Unrestricted as to age or field; may be used abroad or in the United States.

Application deadline: December 1, 1960.

FORD FOUNDATION -- Foreign Area Training Fellowships

A limited number of fellowships for graduate training in the social sciences, including law, and the humanities relating to Asia and the Near East, to the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe, or to Africa (south of the Sahara).

These training fellowships are intended to encourage the combination of foreign area training with training in a discipline and are not designed to support research projects of trained scholars.

Qualifications: Citizens of the United States and Canada or persons planning to become citizens. Candidates should be under 35 years of age. Previous training relating to the foreign area of interest is not required.

Duration of Fellowship: One year unless program of study requires extension.

Stipend: Monthly maintenance allowance (approximately \$210) plus allowances for dependents, tuition, and necessary transportation.

Application deadline: November 1, 1960.

SOCIAL SCIENCE RESEARCH COUNCIL

Grants from the Carnegie Corporation, the Rockefeller Foundation, and the Ford Foundation provide support for the Council's program for advancement of research in social sciences.

Fellowships and grants which are offered without restriction as to disciplinary specialty or area of interest within social science include: Research Training Fellowships, Faculty Research Fellowships, and Grants-in-Aid Research.

Several additional kinds of special fellowships and grants are offered for the purpose of advancing research and training in selected fields or on particular subjects. These include: Fellowships in Political Theory and Legal Philosophy; Summer Research Training Institute stipends; Senior Research Awards in American Governmental Affairs: Grants for Research on American Governmental and Legal Processes; grants for Research on National Security Policy; and jointly with the American Council of Learned Societies, Grants for African Studies, Asian Studies, Studies of Contemporary China, Latin American Studies, Near and Middle Eastern Studies, and Slavic and East European Studies.

Application deadlines vary with the specific fellowship or grant beginning November 1 through February 1.

UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN

Fellowships (150) with stipends from \$400 to \$2500; industrial fellowships (50) with stipends from \$800 to \$2500; research and teaching assistantships (1800) with stipends from \$300 to \$2050; scholarships (25) with stipends from \$300 to \$1100; and non-resident scholarships (150) remitting each semester the \$190 out-of-state fee.

Application deadline: February 15, 1961.

WHITNEY FOUNDATION -- Opportunity Fellowships

Purpose: To provide opportunity for special experience or advanced study for outstanding individuals who might not be able to reach their fullest development or make their fullest contribution without assistance.

Eligibility: U.S. citizens with racial or cultural backgrounds or regions of residence as follows: Negroes, Spanish-Americans, Chinese-Americans and Japanese-Americans, American Indians, residents of Guam, Puerto Rico, Samona, the Virgin Islands, the Appalachian and Ozark Mountain areas, and the Trust Territories. Candidates should have superior promise and be between 22 and 35 years of age.

Fields: Fellowships are open for academic graduate study and for other types of training and experience.

Duration: One year. Grant may be renewed for a second year.

Stipend: From \$1000 to \$3000.

Application deadline: November 30, 1960
