Danny Pierce will present his film "An Artist Makes a Film" which he and one of his students made last year. Mr. Pierce will tell about his movie at the program, which is open to the general public. No admission will be charged.

The Arctic Branch of the American Association for the Advancement of Science will have a dinner Feb. 15 at the Fort Wainwright Officers' Club. Tomorrow is the last day to make reservations for the dinner, according to Arvo Kallio, secretary-treasurer.

"The Metabolism of Ruminants" is the title of the talk Dr. T.A. Rogers, assistant professor of physiology at Stanford University, will give.

The schedule for the evening includes a cocktail hour, 6:30 - 7:30 p.m.; dinner, 7:30 - 8:30 p.m.; meeting and talk, 8:30 p.m.

The meeting is open to members only. Memberships for 1961 at \$1 will be available at the door during the cocktail hour. Each member may bring a guest. Dinner costs will vary, according to what individuals order from the regular menu, Kallio said.

The non-credit astronomy course series is using Dr. Robert H. Baker's text, "Introduction to Astronomy," the 1957 fifth edition.

"Best in Music" on radio station KFRB will offer the following selections this Sunday: "The Union" (based on the music of the North from the years 1861-1865) by Bales; "Symphony No. 5" by Beethoven; "Enigma Variations" by Elgar; "Night on Bald Mountain" (Philadelphia Orchestra, Eugene Ormandy, Cond.), by Moussorgsky; Bach's "Suite No. 2 in B Minor"; and "Serenade No. 9 in D Major (Posthorn) by Mozart.

PIERCE'S PRINT EXHIBITED IN TOKYO

"Pinnacle Skyward" by Danny Pierce, will be on exhibit in Tokyo with the American Color Print Society's traveling show. The print won the Francesco Award of the ACPS of Philadelphia in 1959. It has been on display at several of Professor Pierce's exhibits in Alaska. This is the first time the print has been exhibited in Japan.

Professor Pierce's work is part of the permanent collections of the New York Museum of Modern Art, the Seattle Art Museum, and the Library of Congress. He had works hung in the Third International Exhibition of Contemporary Art.

U-A RECEIVES BIDS FOR NEW HALL

The U-A recently opened bids for the construction of a 144-man residence hall during the coming season. The contract award will be made within a few days after U-A officials have reviewed the bids.

Bidders on the project and their bids were as follows: Hebb and Narodick of Seattle, \$637,681; Industrial and Commercial of Fairbanks, \$670,998; B-E-C-K of Seattle, \$685,810; C & R of Seattle, \$697,000; Alcan Pacific of Anchorage, \$729,700; Burgess of Fairbanks, \$732,178; Inlet Co. of Anchorage, \$737,975; Ghemm of Fairbanks, \$790,800; Canoro and Birkliid of Fairbanks, \$797,222; Nelse Mortensen of Seattle, \$808,000; and Chris Berg of Seattle, \$823,000.

Among those present for the bid opening were Edward E. Sands of the firm of Olsen and Sands, Architects, of Juneau, who designed the building, and John Nichols of the HHFA office in Anchorage.
