SWEDISH PLANTS RECEIVED

The U-A Herbarium has received a large and valuable collection of plants from Sweden. The collection, which consists of 1600 different plant species collected in Sweden in the 1920's and 1930's, is especially valuable because they have been identified by Dr. Eric Hulten, who collected them, and other European specialists. Dr. Hulten, who is director of the Botanical Museum of Stockholm, has written several books on the flora of Alaska and it is due to his personal interest in the state that the U-A received the collection.

The plants, which are dried and mounted, will be added to the Herbarium collections, which now number approximately 12,000 specimens. About 50 per cent of the plants are similar to those found in Alaska and the remainder are in closely related groups.

MT. MCKINLEY MAP PRESENTED TO LIBRARY

The Library now has two copies of a new map of Mt. McKinley which was surveyed by Dr. Bradford Washburn, internationally famous scientist who has lead seven expeditions to, up and over America's highest mountain.

The large-scale, full color map which was edited by Dr. Washburn, was just published in Bern, Switzerland, and was printed by the Swiss Federal Institute of Topography, considered the world's top expert map making firm.

Dr. Washburn, who received an honorary Ph.D. from the U-A in 1951, stated all proceeds from the map, which sells for \$2, will be added to the Alaska Research Fund of the Museum of Science, Boston.

The map can be examined in the Library during regular hours.

MANCHU ORGANIZATION DAY

Manchu Organization Day, March 26, will be celebrated two days early. The celebration is scheduled for Friday and Saturday, and will begin with numerous field events on Friday, Saturday morning will be the big event, the annual ski parade. NURSE COURSE AT ACC

Anchorage Community College will offer courses in practical nursing for the first time next fall. The courses will be taught through the cooperation of the extension service of the University of Washington.

Cost of the courses will be about \$1200, but Eugnee Short, ACC director, said they would be self-supporting and will not place any financial burden on the school district.

About forty persons have already indicated they are interested in taking the courses, which will provide for certification of school nurses. Those who pass the courses will be able to meet state standards for school nurses.

GRAIN PRODUCTION INCREASING

Feed grain production in Alaska quadrupled from 1955 to 1960, according to figures compiled by the Alaska Division of Agriculture, Alaska Experiment Station and Agricultural Marketing Service.

The total production of oats and barley in 1960 was approximately 3360 tons from 3700 acres. However, consumption by Alaskan livestock greatly exceeds production at this time.

"S.B. No. 38--Authorizing the State of Alaska to join in the Western Interstate Correction Compact, thereby making possible future contractual arrange-

ments with other states for the incarceration of prisoners. (Chapter 18, SLA 1961)." "CS (Committee Substitute) for H.B. No. 49 -- Extending the life of an automobile operator's license from two years to three and increasing the license fee from \$3 to \$5. (Chapter 19, SLA 1961)".
