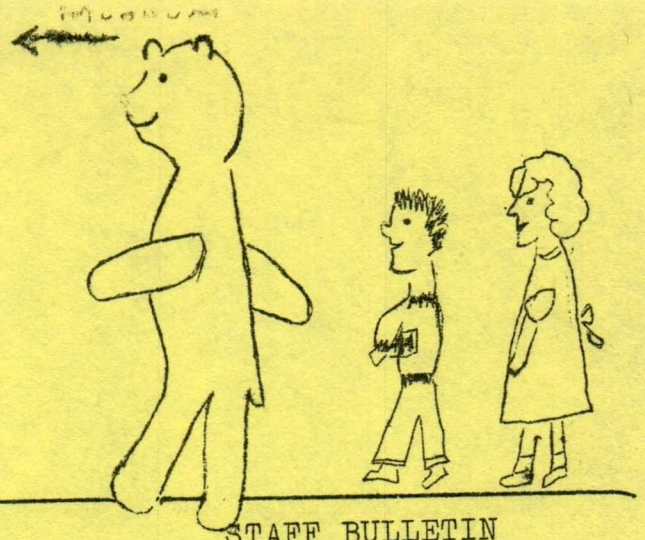

FESTIVAL OF ARTS CONTINUES

The fourth annual Festival of Arts continues through this week and the beginning of next. Tonight at 8 o'clock, the artist Gabor Peterdi will speak on "Art and Education" in the second of a series of lectures. Tomorrow night, also at 8, he will speak on "Art and Society". Both of these talks will be given in the Mines Building auditorium.

Sunday evening, at 8 in the Bunnell lecture hall, Tom Wilcox will direct a discussion for "An Evening of Modern Poetry". Dr. Anne Bolgan and Dr. Arthur Wills will assist.

Two more musical programs will be presented in conjunction with the Festival of Arts. Tomorrow at 8 p.m. the Fairbanks Community Band will present a concert in the gymnasium. CWO Richard Zoller conducts the band. Joseph Haydn's "The Creation" will be presented Sunday afternoon at 8. Guest artists Dr. Frank L. D'Andrea and Dr. Bernard Regier, conductor and bass soloist, respectively, will be on the program Sunday.

"Mr. Hulot's Holiday", the film which won the International Critics Prize at the Cannes Film Festival, will be at 8 p.m., April 14 and 15 in the Bunnell Lecture hall.

In addition, there are many interesting exhibitions to be seen on campus - the Japanese Prints (museum); 50 Best Books (Bunnell lobby); Western Home Awards (Engineering Building); Chairs from Machines and Peterdi Prints (library mezzanine); Fortune covers (B. lobby) and CARE dolls (Museum).

CHEMIST TO SPEAK HERE FOR SIGMA XI

"The Dot of Ignorance" is the title of a public lecture which Dr. Harry H. Batey, Jr. will give to the U-A Sigma Xi Club at 8 p.m. Tuesday. Batey, associate professor of chemistry at Washington State University, will visit on campus April 18, 19 and 20. His visit to Alaska is sponsored by the Committee on Visiting Scientists, Division of Chemical Education, American Chemical Society.

In addition to his talk Tuesday in the Bunnell lecture hall, Dr. Batey will speak to university chemistry classes and to Lathrop High School students. According to word received from him, his talk is "semi-historical, semi-philosophical and semi-chemical."

Dr. Batey received his bachelor of arts degree from Cornell College, Iowa, his master of science degree at Ohio State University, and his doctor of philosophy from that same institution.

While on campus, Dr. Batey will be hosted by Dr. William Wilson and the faculty of the Chemistry Department.

Featured on this Sunday's program will be Rossini's "The Barber of Seville (overture)" played by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, Fritz Reiner, conducting; "Symphony No. 4 in A, Op. 90 (Italian)" by Mendelssohn, with the Boston Symphony Orchestra conducted by Charles Munch; "Brandenburg Concertos Nos. 1, 2 and 3" by Bach - the Boston Symphony Orchestra; Haydn's "Symphony No. 100 in G (Military)", the Bamberg Symphony Orchestra with Ferdinand Leitner as conductor; "Concerto No. 1 in E-Flat Major" by Liszt with Philippe Entremont, pianist, and the Philadelphia Orchestra conducted by Eugene Ormandy; various selections by Victor Herbert and the chorus and orchestra of the Vienna State Opera, Anton Paulik, conducting playing and singing German university songs by various composers.
