



GEOCHEMICAL PROSPECTING COURSE SET

ORDWAY APPOINTED BASKETBALL COACH

Allan William (Bill) Ordway will be the basketball coach at the U-A for the coming school year, it was revealed by Dr. William R. Wood this week.

Ordway will join the faculty as assistant professor of physical education. For the past seven years he has been a teacher and basketball coach at the Juneau-Douglas High School.

Among the organizations of which he is a member, Ordway lists the Alaska Education Association, the National Education and Rotary. He is a Presbyterian. He received his Bachelor of Science degree in 1947 from the University of North Dakota and a Master of Science degree in 1949 from the University of Pennsylvania.

Ordway was born in Mandan, N.D., on May 8, 1917. He is married and he and his wife, June, have one daughter, Tausbee Kim.

In addition to teaching in Juneau, Ordway has been on the faculty of schools in Miles City, Mont.; Lewiston, Idaho; and Wyndmere, N.D.; and was an associate professor at Jamestown College, N.D.

During his sports career, he has been on collegiate football and intramural softball, basketball and track teams. He has played professional rugby, basketball and with the Army football team in France. As a member of the U.S. Army, Ordway traveled in Africa, France and Italy.

His record of five Southeastern championships and four All-Alaska High School championships in seven years at Juneau rates him as top basketball coach in Alaska, according to Fred Boyle.
