NEW EVENING CLASS ANNOUNCED

Dean Earl Beistline, College of Earth Science and Mineral Industry, and Dean Arthur Buswell, Division of Statewide Services, announced the addition of a new subject to the mining short course.

"Mineral Preparation" is the title of the new evening class and is designed to acquaint the prospector, miner and other students with the modern milling techniques for processing low-grade mineral deposits into marketable products.

Pre-registrations are being taken this week, Dr. Buswell said. Course registration will take place at the time of the first class in Room 201, Brooks Memorial Bldg., Tuesday, Oct. 9.
