ANNUAL NEW FACULTY RECEPTION SCHEDULED FOR FRIDAY AT PRESIDENT'S RESIDENCE

UNIVERSITY OF ALASKA AROUND THE STATE

Mining Extension - The University's program of offering short courses in mining around the State got underway this week with a class in geochemistry offered in Anchorage. The popular prospecting course will begin in Anchorage on September 30 and in Fort Yukon on September 23. Leo Mark Anthony is teaching the Anchorage courses and Roger Markle is teaching the Fort Yukon Course.

On-Base Classes - Dr. Howard Cutler and the academic deans met today with instructors for the Fort Wainwright evening program of University classes to discuss plans for the semester. The luncheon meeting was held at Ft. Wainwright.

Last week a similar meeting was held at Eielson A.F.B. prior to the beginning of on-base classes September 16. More than 350 students are enrolled in the Eielson program.

Fallout Shelter Course - The University Cooperative Extension Service is offering a Fallout Shelter Analysis Program this semester at the Anchorage Community College. The two credit course, taught by John Burdick, assistant professor of civil engineering, is specifically designed for licensed architects and engineers or for those who have a Bachelor of Architecture or Science Degree. The course, similar to ones offered in other colleges throughout the nation, trains the students to analyze
