U OF A COLLEGE BOWL APPEARANCE WILL BE RETELEVISED

Television station KTVF (channel 11) will rebroadcast our GE-College Bowl Team's appearance of last June against Temple University this Sunday at 6 p.m. Students who represented the University on this nationally televised program were Sandra Scott, Ben Harding, Bill Stern and Jane Schaible. The Temple Team, which won in the contest of agile responses and quick recall, opens the Fall season of the College Bowl program this month to try for their fifth win. The U-A team was the fourth team to lose to Temple.

COMPUTER CENTER TO OFFER FALL COURSES

The Computer Center will offer a series of courses during the next two weeks to familiarize faculty, staff and students with the operation and programming of the IBM 1620 computer. Four courses will be taught, with the first course beginning tomorrow, September 27. The courses are:

Introduction to FORTRAN programming - this 10-hour course covers the FORTRAN language used in working with the 1620. It is designed for those who might wish to use the 1620 on specific problems. No experience is necessary. The class will be taught Oct. 1, 3, 5, 7, and 9 from 7 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. in Bunnell 13.

FORTRAN II programming - a two-hour course taught Friday Sept. 27 from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. This course will cover the differences between FORTRAN I and FORTRAN II and is open to those familiar with FORTRAN I. The class will be in Bunnell 13.

Operation of punched card equipment - This three-hour course covers the operation of equipment available in the Data Center, including the key punch, sorter, 407 accounting machine, interpreter, and reproducer. The course will be held from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. in Bunnell 3, October 4.

Use of Statistical Program Library - This course is designed for advanced students, faculty and staff desiring to perform statistical analysis. This course will not cover any programming. Date and time to be announced.

The station was all ready to go on the air at its usual sign-on time Sunday.

VISITORS ON CAMPUS THIS WEEK

Nineteen men interested in Arctic and sub-Arctic research visited the campus Monday on their way south from the Arctic Research Laboratory at Point Barrow. The visitors, whose trip was sponsored by the Arctic Institute of North America, and Naval Research, spent the day visiting the various research institutes on campus. Included in the group were several Canadian researchers.

Local news media representatives visited the campus Tuesday for a preview visit to the University Commons and the new health, physical education and recreation facility. The group, which included representatives of the local newspapers, radio and television stations, attended a luncheon in the Commons and were taken on tours of both new buildings.

Swiss Consul Alfred Schaublin was a campus visitor on Wednesday. Mr. Schaublin gave a lecture to students and faculty members and toured the campus. While at the University he was hosted by Dr. William M. Dickson, dean of the College of Business, Economics, and Government.
