TOTAL ENROLLMENT REACHES 3960

Total enrollment for the fall semester now stands at 3960 - far above last year's first semester enrollment of 3581.

Broken down, the enrollment shows:

On campus enrollment (day class) - 1226.

Community College enrollment - 1203; Anchorage, 915; Juneau-Douglas, 128; Ketchikan, 103; Palmer, 28; Sitka, 29.

Evening and Off-Campus enrollment - 1531; Elmendorf-Fort Richardson, 813; Adak, 35; Kodiak, 68; Kenai, 47; Eielson, 283; Ft. Wainwright, 222; Campus, 49; Fairbanks, 14.

HUMAN BEHAVIOR COLLOQUIUM STARTS NOVEMBER 5

The first in a series of inter-college colloquiums on human behavior will be held Tuesday (Nov. 5) at 4 p.m. in Room 114-115 of the Bunnell Building.

The series will feature monthly discussions by staff members and campus visitors on current techniques, problems, and research in their fields.

Sponsored by the College of Behavioral Sciences and Education, the College of Business Economics, and Government, and the Institute of Business, Economics and Government, the discussions are open to faculty, staff, graduate students, and upperclassmen majoring in these areas.

Dr. William Dickson, dean of the College of Business, Economics and Government and acting head of the Institute, will address the first colloquium on his research into the functioning of organizations. He will also describe the nature and current status of projects being undertaken by the Institute.

The presentation will be followed by a discussion and answer period over coffee.

ALUMNI GAME TONIGHT

The traditional Polar Bear - Alumni basketball game will be played tonight at 8 p.m. in the gymnasium of the Patty Building.

The game will mark the first use of the building for a spectator athletic event.

A preliminary inter-squad game between members of the freshman team will precede the main event.

SNACK BAR OPENS

The University snack bar had its grand opening in its new location yesterday. Now located on the second floor of Constitution Hall, the snack bar will take the coffee break load off personnel in the University Commons, which has been serving as both cafeteria and snack bar.

The Commons will now be open for meal service only - to persons holding meal tickets and those wishing to purchase full meals. Hours at the Commons will be: breakfast, 6:30 a.m. - 8:30 a.m.; lunch, 11:15 a.m. - 1:15 p.m.; and dinner, 5 p.m. - 7:30 p.m.

The new snack bar will be open 7:30 a.m. - 10:30 p.m. Sunday through Thursday, and 7:30 a.m. - midnight on Fridays and Saturdays. It offers short orders, sandwiches, snacks, fountain service and coffee.

The back portion of the snack bar has been closed off as a faculty lounge and dining room. Persons or groups wishing to reserve this room for meetings may do so by contacting the Office of the Dean of Students.

HEURLIN PAINTINGS ON DISPLAY

The Student Union Activities Office will sponsor an exhibition of paintings by C. (Rusty) Heurlin, a well-known Alaskan artist who lives in Berry, about six miles from the campus.

The paintings, part of the University Museum collection, will be on display in the Constitution Hall snack bar Nov. 4-9.
