A TASTE OF GERMANY

"Sie sind herzlich eingeladen zu der deutschen Ausstellung!"

We are assured by the people in linguistics and languages that the above is an invitation to participate in the German Cultural Exhibit which opens Monday on campus.

The main floor corridor in Bunnell will take on a gay atmosphere with colorful exhibits of German books, coins, art prints and photographs. Color films, in English, will be presented in Duckering Auditorium at 7:30 p.m. Monday and Wednesday and at 4:30 p.m. on Tuesday and Thursday. They will feature both cities and rural areas of Germany.

To open the exhibit Minister Dr. Herbert Freiherr (Baron) von Stackelberg, West German Minister to the United States, will address interested students and faculty at 2 p.m. Monday in Schaible Auditorium. Baron von Stackelberg also will speak briefly at the evening film showing.

As one member of the language department said, with a slight German accent, "Come along, you all"

PARKING LOT OPEN

The parking lot behind the Bunnell Building is open for business with room for approximately 100 cars and with 46 headbolt heating installations. The lot has been resurfaced and enlarged since the first of the month. NEW INDEX SYSTEM IN LIBRARY

A new type of reference index to the literature of science is now available in the Main Library. Known as the Science Citation Index, the international interdisciplinary index uses a method previously used only in the field of law--as in Shepard's citators for law. Director of Libraries H. Theodore Ryberg explains the system this way:

"Scholars normally take note of footnotes which tell them about articles in hand which are concerned with the same area of information. These references are always to work done earlier than the article in hand. The Citation Index simply reverses this procedure. The user looks up the article in hand and the Citation Index tells him what papers written since the one in hand cite it as a reference--within the scope and limits of the coverage of the Citation Index."

Prepared and published by the Institute for Scientific Information in Philadelphia, the five-volume set for 1961 contains over 2600 pages, indexes articles in 613 journals with a million and a half citations. The set is located on the lower level of the library, does not circulate outside the library, and is classified Z, 7401, S365. The Index has recently been enlarged and changed to a continuing service and will be published quarterly with an annual accumulation. Whether or not the library continues to subscribe to the service will be determined by its use by and usefulness to the faculty, graduate students, and researchers.
