## CALENDAR REVISION

Upon recommendation of the ASUA and concurrence by the Academic Council, the official University calendar for the spring semester, 1965-66 school year, will be changed as follows: Campus Day will be on Saturday, April 30 and not on the 29th as previously scheduled. Classes will meet as usual on April 29 and April 30. Spring recess will begin at 5 p.m., Wednesday, March 16 and end at 8 a.m. Monday, March 21. (Activities during Campus Day will be arranged around class schedules.)

## KOREAN DANCER

Dr. Won-Kyung Cho, a Korean dancer, will present a recital in Schaible Hall Feb. 4 at 8 p.m. (tomorrow evening). Dr. Cho is currently touring the U.S. presenting dance recitals at major universities and recital halls. There will be no admission charge.

## CATHEDRAL FUND

Campus collections for the St. Michael's Cathedral Fund now total \$55, according to Jimmy Bedford, assoc. prof. and head, Journalism Department, who is fund drive chairman. "This is not very impressive," Bedford said, "when you consider that we have some 300 faculty and staff members and about 1,600 students--and only nine persons have made any contributions." Bedford is hopeful that the benefit recital of Rubin Decker and Jean-Paul Billaud (see story below) will bring in a sizeable sum. Checks may be made out to St. Michael's Cathedral Fund and turned in at the concert entrance or sent directly to Bedford, room 109, Bunnell Building.

## DECKER RECITAL SOLOIST

Rubin Decker, assoc. prof. of music at the University, and Jean-Paul Billaud, asst. prof. of music, will present a concert of rarely-heard classic compositions in Schaible Hall Feb. 6, at 4 p.m. Included in the program will be lesser-known works by Ernest Black, Johann Sebastian Bach, Johann Christian Bach, Franz Schubert and Peter Tchaikowsky.

Decker, a concert violist, has performed with the Indianapolis Symphony, Los Angeles Symphony and Hollywood Bowl Symphony, among others. Persons attending Sunday's concert will have an opportunity to contribute to the St. Michael's Cathedral Fund or the Sitka Historical Restoration Fund.

## PRODUCTION UNDERWAY

Thornton Wilder's "The Skin of Our Teeth" will be the Drama Workshop's next production, according to Lee H. Salisbury, assoc. prof. and head, Department of Speech, Drama and Radio. Salisbury said the play will probably be taken to the International Drama Festival, to be held in either Whitehorse or Anchorage.

## TEST CENTER

The University of Alaska has been designated as a test center for administering the National Teacher Examinations March 19, 1966, Dr. Ken Martin, head, counseling and testing, has announced. College seniors preparing to teach and teachers applying for positions in school systems which encourage or require applicants to submit their scores on the National Teacher Examinations along with their other credentials are eligible to take the tests. The examinations are prepared and administered by Educational Testing Service, Princeton, N.J.

## CONSTITUTION DAY

There will be no speeches or ceremonies, but Feb. 5 will pass with special meaning for many Alaskans. That is the day Alaska's State Constitution was finally signed in 1956 in Constitution Hall on the University campus. Governor William A. Egan recently announced that all of the 55 original delegates to the Constitutional Convention have been invited to a reunion here, set for April 23, 24, 1966, the date the constitution was ratified.

## ENROLLMENTS CLIMB

According to the National Assoc. of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges, Alaska's increase in new students enrolled, 17.9%, is far above the average 10.8 percent jump for other Far West states. In freshmen, Nevada led the way with a 121.8 percent increase, while Alaska placed second with 60.4 percent.

## RIFLE TEAM OFF

The University's varsity and women's rifle teams left Fairbanks Wednesday night for Corvallis, Ore., where they will compete in the North Pacific States Intercollegiate Sectional Rifle Tournament Feb. 5-6. MSgt. Everad Horton, Army ROTC instructor and rifle team coach, expressed optimism about the team's prospects for returning with high scores and some All-American shooters.
