

DR. WENDELL WOLFE APPOINTED DEAN IN COLLEGE OF BEHAVIORAL SCIENCES AND EDUCATION

Dr. Wendell W. Wolfe has been appointed dean of the College of Behavioral Sciences and Education, according to an announcement by Dr. William R. Wood, university president.

Effective July 1, Dr. Wolfe will assume his new post following four years as head of the Department of Summer Sessions, Conferences and Short Courses.

He will succeed Dr. Charles K. Ray, present dean of the college, who will be on sabbatical leave from the university during the 1968-69 academic year. Dr. Ray will be conducting post-doctoral studies and research from a base at Columbia University in New York City.

Dr. Wolfe joined the UA faculty in October, 1964, after completion of his doctoral program at the University of Texas. He received his master's degree at Texas College of Arts and Industries in 1952 and his bachelor's at North Texas University in 1948.

From 1962-1964 he was a graduate student at the University of Texas under a W.K. Kellogg Foundation Fellowship in the Junior College Leadership Program.

His earlier experience include serving as elementary principal in Robstown, Texas, 1961-62; assistant high school principal in Robstown, Texas, 1959-61; district Scout executive for Boy Scouts of America in Corpus Christi, Texas, 1955-59; elementary principal in Rio Hondo, Texas 1954-55; junior high teacher in Rio Hondo, 1948-54; and Army Air Corps, 1944-45.

He has published in several journals and has served on UA committees. He is chairman of the Committee on Sabbatical Leave.

His organization memberships include College Rotary Club, University Baptist Church, executive board of Midnight Sun Council of Boy Scouts of America, Masons, American Association of Junior Colleges, National Association of College and University Summer Sessions, Western Association of Deans and Directors of Summer Sessions, National Education Association, Adult Education Association of the U.S., and Phi Delta Kappa.
