HURRAHII

That gradually increasing roar you heard around campus Tuesday night and early Wednesday morning was the university community cheering the results of the university's \$16.9-million bond election.

The roar was both individual and collective. That is, the hurrahs were voiced by faculty and staff, either individually twirling dials on the radio and television sets or collectively whooping it up at election night parties.

The bond vote tally as Nanook News went to press was: Yes--34,188; No--14,259. This represents a 70 per cent approval vote.

In contrast, the top vote-getting bond proposal on the state ballot, the highway construction issue, won 79 per cent of the ballots cast. The issue that fared poorest, although it still passed, was the ferry construction proposal. It gained 56 per cent of votes cast.

All seven of the state's bonding proposals were approved by voters. The university's proposal gained the fourth highest number of votes.

VISITING CHEMIST TO LECTURE

Dr. William B. Jolly, professor of chemistry at the University of California at Berkeley, will present two lectures this week dealing with his current research activities.

Today, November 10, Dr. Jolly will discuss "Liquid Ammonia Chemistry." The lecture will be at 1 p.m. in Duckering 318.

At 2 p.m. Friday, November 11, Dr. Jolly will discuss his work with sulfur-nitrogen compounds. This lecture also will be in Duckering 318.

Dr. Jolly's visit was made possible through the support of the American Chemical Society's Committee on Visiting Scientists and a grant from the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation.

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COMMUNITY COLLEGE ENROLLMENT INCREASES

Total enrollment in the University of Alaska's six Community Colleges is up 14 per cent over last year, according to figures released last week by the Division of Statewide Services.

Enrollment in academic programs at the colleges increased 27 per cent from 1,173 to 1,552 students, while non-academic program enrollment rose from 1,405 to 1,452.

The biggest percentage jump came in the Kenai Community College where academic enrollment increased from 21 to 73 and non-academic enrollment rose from 52 to 103.

Anchorage, the largest of the six colleges, increased from 886 to 1,085 academic enrollments and reported a drop in non-academic enrollments from 961 to 827.

ANNEXSTAD LEAVES FOR MACQUARIE ISLAND

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John O. Annexstad, a senior research assistant at the Geophysical Institute, leaves for Macquarie Island in the South Pacific next week to participate in a micropulsation study for the Institute.

Sponsored by a \$26,500 grant from the National Science Foundation, Office of Antarctic Programs, his trip involves the study of small fluctuations in the earth's magnetic field at conjugate points, locations linked by the same magnetic field line.

Macquarie Island was selected because it is a conjugate point to Kotzebue on the Arctic coast.

The study is under the direction of Dr. Charles R. Wilson of the Geophysical Institute. Annexstad will operate observation equipment at Macquarie Island and will use the results of the research program for a doctoral dissertation.
