COMPUTER CENTER OFFERS OPERATIONS COURSE

Confused by computers? Can't talk their language?

Here's a chance to learn how they operate and what they can do for you.

The Computer Center is now offering a lecture series on administrative computer operations. The series is primarily for administrative employees of the university whose responsibilities require them to have some knowledge of the university's computing capability.

The six-week series of lectures is offered on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 3:30 to 5:00 p.m. in Room 117 Bunnell.

In the first series of lectures, held this week, Edward Gauss, head of the Computer Center, presented an introduction to computing machines entitled "This is a Punched Card."

The second series, March 28 and 30, will be taught by Tom Garvey, guest lecturer from the IBM Customer Education Group. He will cover designing work tasks to make efficient use of computers.

Lectures on April 4, 6, 11, 13, 18 and 20 will cover the COBOL programming language. The text for this series, Introduction to COBOL, may be borrowed from the Computer Center or purchased for \$2.50.

The last two programs on April 25 and 27 will feature a staff description of the data processing systems at the university.
