Ceremonies marking the 50th anniversary of the University of Alaska will be held on campus Wednesday, May 3. The ceremonies will be held in conjunction with the annual observance of Governor's Day.

Events scheduled for the day include the annual R.O.T.C. Awards ceremony, ground-breaking ceremonies for the new Library, Humanities and Fine Arts Center, and a Golden Anniversary Convocation.

The awards ceremony will be held at 10:30 a.m. in the Patty Building cymnasium. Gov. Walter J. Hickel will present one of the awards, the coveted Governor's Medal, awarded annually to the outstanding cadet in the corps.

The ground-breaking ceremonies will begin at 1:30 p.m. near the old university power plant.

Gov. Hickel will participate in the ceremony, along with Board of Regents President Elmer Rasmuson and university President Dr. William R. Wood. The university Concert Band and Choir of the North will provide music for the occasion.

A Golden Anniversary Convocation will be held at 8:15 p.m. in the Patty Building Gymnasium. The program will include addresses by Governor Hickel, Board of Regents President Rasmuson and Dr. Wood.

University Marshal William Cashen will discuss events leading to the enactment of State Senate Bill 15, which created the university, May 3, 1917, in a talk, "Fifty Years Ago Today".

A reception honoring Governor and Mrs. Hickel will be held in the Patty Building foyer after the convocation. The University Women's Association will serve refreshments.

ENGLE LECTURE TO CONCLUDE FESTIVAL

A talk by noted poet, author and critic Paul Engle will highlight the final weekend of Fine Arts Festival activities.

Engle is director of the Program in Creative Writing at the University of Iowa. He will lecture Sunday, April 23, and will meet with students of the Writers' Workshop Saturday, April 22.

His lecture, "Poetry and You", is scheduled for 8:30 p.m. in the University Commons.

Other remaining Pestival activities include performances of "South Pacific" and "Private Lives".

"South Pacific" will be presented by the university Music Department at 8:15 tonight (April 20) and Friday evening (April 21) in Hering Auditorium at Lathrop High School. The production will have a cast of 40, backed by a full pit orchestra.

The final three performances of the Drama Workshop production "Private Lives" will be held tomorrow through Sunday, April 21-23. Performances tomorrow and Saturday will be held at 8:15 p.m. in Schaible Hall. Sunday's performance will be a matinee at 2:30 p.m.

Tickets for "South Pacific" and "Private Lives" are still on sale at the university Bookstore and at Adler's Book Store, the A-1 Record Shop, Hoitt's Music Store, the International Shop and the Hobby House in Fairbanks.

A rare glacier bear, polar bears, seals, a musk ox and other mammals native to the arctic will be the stars of an open house at the University Museum Friday night (April 21).

The animals will be on display in a new mammal exhibit, which will open at 7 p.m.

The exhibit is one of several prepared by the Museum for the Alaska Centennial Purchase celebration and the university's 50th anniversary.

Many of the mammals will be displayed against panoramic scenes depicting their native habitats. The scenes were painted by James Greiner, technical assistant at the Museum.

All faculty and staff members are invited to attend the open house and view the new exhibit. Refreshments will be served.

MADRIGAL SINGERS PLAN CONCERTS IN REMOTE AREAS

The University of Alaska Madrigal Singers will make a 3-day concert tour next week of remote towns in Alaska under their new program, "Music to the Bush".

The singers, under the direction of Prof. Greeta K. Brown, will visit Barrow, Nome, Kotzebue and Unalakleet as part of the activities marking the 50th anniversary of the university.

The tour will begin Friday, April 28 with a concert at Barrow. The next day, the singers will perform in Kotzebue. On the last day of the tour, they will sing in Nome in the afternoon and in Unalakleet in the evening.

All concerts will be held in village schools.

This is the first time a Music Department group has toured the remote areas of Alaska. If the tour is successful, the program will be continued next year, according to Mrs. Brown.
