

UA DEDICATION OF BARTLETT HALL DORMITORY SCHEDULED OCT. 18; LIBRARY, MUSEUM PLAN SPECIAL EVENTS TO COINCIDE WITH CEREMONY

The University will dedicate its \$2.9 million Bartlett Hall dormitory Oct. 18.

The 322-unit dormitory which opened this fall will be dedicated in ceremonies at 2:30 p.m. in the first floor lounge at the building. The dedication is being held in conjunction with the Bartlett Day Dinner in Fairbanks to honor the late E. L. (Bob) Bartlett, U.S. senator from Alaska.

John Butrovich, former president of the State Senate, will be guest speaker during the dedication. William A. O'Neill, president of the UA Board of Regents, will preside.

Mrs. Vide Bartlett, widow of the late senator, and Mrs. Ray Wrede, secretary of the regents, will unveil a commemorative plaque for the building and Mrs. Bartlett will give a response at the dedication.

Kathy Clark, a student living at Bartlett Hall, will give the student response. She researched material from Bartlett's speeches and papers for the dedication plaque.

In observance of the dedication, the new University Library will hold an open house Friday and Saturday afternoons, Oct. 17 and 18, from 3 to 5 o'clock. The library staff will show visitors through the new five-floor library which opened last week.

Bartlett, who first went to Washington, D.C. in 1945 as Alaska's territorial representative, was the 25th student to register at the university in 1923 when it was known as the Alaska Agricultural College and School of Mines. In 1960 he was cited by the university with an honorary Doctor of Laws degree.

After his death last December, the Bartlett papers were assigned to the university's archives where they will be made available for research.

The eight-story dormitory, with four floors open this year, and four more to be opened next year, completes the final phase of the three building dormitory-dining complex to serve 782 students. A food service facility to occupy a portion of the first floor of Bartlett Hall will be completed late in 1970.

Bartlett Hall towers as the central building in the complex and was constructed with a reinforced concrete core and prefabricated concrete wall panels.

Each dormitory room is designed to serve two students and has built-in furniture and study areas. There is a small lounge on each floor and a large television and reception lounge on the first floor. The building contains about 80,000 square feet of floor space.

KUAC FEATURES GRAMOPHONE RECORDING

Saturday, Oct. 11, KUAC will present on "Saturday Afternoon at the Opera" a Deutsche Gramophone recording of Ludwig von Beethoven's only opera, Fidelio.

Fidelio gave Beethoven more trouble than any other of his works. The first performances of the original three-act version took place in November of 1805, just after the French armies had marched into Vienna.

Rearranged and shortened to two acts, the opera was brought out again the following March, but was immediately withdrawn. Finally, in 1814, a third version, with still more extensive revisions, was successful. In the course of all these changes Beethoven wrote four different overtures for the opera. Three of them are now known as the Leonore overtures.

The opera will be aired at 2 p.m.
