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## LOIS M. MOREY CONCLUDES VISIT TO UNIVERSITY

Miss Lois M. Morey, Education Supervisor from the Territorial Department of Education, left on this morning's train for Suntrana on a school visitation before returning to her headquarters in Juneau.

Miss Morey was in constant demand as a consultant in various Education courses during her five day visit at the University. On Tuesday she was guest speaker at the Language Arts Workshop, where she explained the Alaska school system and answered the many questions put to her by members of the class.

Thursday afternoon she was the featured speaker at an assembly program in the Brooks auditorium. She illustrated her talk with a collection of Kodrachrome slides taken at different rural communities of the Territory, showing the living conditions in the communities and the schools which are maintained there. Following the assembly a reception in Miss Morey's honor was held in the lounge of the home economics department. Townspeople as well as the summer students and faculty attended the reception and later visited the weaving class where members of the class exhibited the many beautiful scarfs, blankets, table sets and afghans they have made this summer.

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## LATHROP COMPANY GIVES PIPE ORGAN TO U. OF ALASKA

The pipe organ in the Empress Theatre in Anchorage has been presented to the students of the University of Alaska by the Lathrop Company in memory of the company's founder, Austin E. "Cap"

Lathrop, who served as a member of the Board of Regents from 1932 until his death in 1950.

Gift of this organ was secured through the efforts of Allen Harrah, a summer session students from Anchorage, who is an organ technician as well as an accomplished organist. Mr. Harrah plans to remain at the University to study electrical engineering and will be in charge of the installations of the \$20,000 instrument when a suitable place for it has been found.

Announcement of the gift was made at the summer session dinner on Wednesday by President-elect E. N. Fatty, who had been notified of the Lathrop Company's decision by Mr. E. F. Medley, President.
