FIFTY TEACHERS ARRIVE FOR ALASKA RURAL SCHOOL PROJECT INSTITUTE

Fifty teachers arriving from 15 different states will take part in the Summer Institute in Alaska Rural Education beginning July 5 and ending August 19.

Addressing the participants at the welcome ceremony will be Dr. William R. Wood, President of the University of Alaska; Mr. Owen Morken, Regional Director, Bureau of Indian Affairs; and Mr. William T. Zahradnicek, Commissioner of Education, Alaska Department of Education.

Participants will attend special topic lectures throughout the seven-week Institute. Topics included in these lectures will be school-community relations, village help and sanitation, and orientation to the Bureau of Indian Affairs and State Department of Education.

Visits also will be made by the participants to the Alaskan villages in which they will teach this coming fall.

The Institute is planned for experienced teachers who will teach in the elementary schools of rural Alaska. It is supported by a grant from the Ford Foundation.

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HOUSING NEEDED

Five members of a Japanese publishing firm will visit Fairbanks July 4-7 to collect, observe and study culture, customs, languages and history of Alaska from the viewpoint of folk lore. They will use the material collected in several books and for educational purposes in Japan. Arrangements are being made for them to meet with various people on campus.

INTRODUCING SUMMER SESSIONS GUEST FACULTY

Dr. R. Merwin Deever, Director of the Bureau of Educational Research and Services at Arizona State University, is teaching courses in public school administration and finance. Dr. Deever has many years' experience in public school teaching and administration and has directed numerous surveys and research projects related to public school organization and administration.

Dr. Arthur R. DeLong, professor of psychology at Grand Valley State College at Grand Rapids, Michigan, will be teaching courses in educational psychology, of which will give special emphasis to the education of the young child. Dr. DeLong has written numerous research papers and articles for professional journals in his field.

Dr. Greta L. DeLong, associate professor of education at Grand Valley State College, and wife of Arthur DeLong, is teaching courses in social studies curriculum development and teaching methods. She has had several years' experience as a social studies teacher in the public schools and has a very special interest in the development of creative methods for teaching.

Dr. Robert S. Hage, associate professor in the Counseling Center at San Fernando State College in California is teaching courses in tests and measurements and educational psychology. This is his second summer on campus. While Dr. Hage is teaching, his wife and three children are taking courses in the regular Summer Sessions.

SCIENCE-MATHEMATICS TEACHERS IN FULL SWING

The NSF Summer Institute for Secondary Teachers of Science and Mathematics which began June 13 is now in full swing, according to Professor William R. Cashen, director. Last-minute withdrawals brought the anticipated total enrollment of 51 to 49, which includes 14 Alaskan teachers and 35 from other states.

Dr. John G. Tryon's course in basic physics has 32 enrolled, and Dr. Charles Rowett's earth science class has 31. Dr. Thomas Head's class in modern secondary school mathematics has 29. Other classes, in order of size, are topics in geology, 25, applications of mathematics, 17, and modern algebra, 15.

Besides the formal classes the participants hear special guest lecturers and attend seminars in one of three areas: mathematics, earth science or general science.

Guest lecturers so far have included Dr. Brina Kessel, dean of the College of Biological Sciences and Renewable Resources; Dean Earl H. Beistline of the College of Earth Sciences and Mineral Industry; and Dr. Victor Hessler, professor of geophysics.

Members of the earth science class enjoyed an all-day field trip up the Steese Highway last Saturday. Accompanied by an excellent commentary by Dean Earl Beistline, participants toured the ice tunnel of permafrost at Fox, a placer mine, Cleary Stamp Mill and Chatanika dredge. A stop was made at the Chatanika River bridge, where everyone panned for . . . and found . . . real Alaskan gold.

Roland Petit. Introduced by Maurice Chevalier

Four narrative ballets by Roland Petit, brilliant dancer-choreographer of the famed Ballet de Paris, are presented in a vivid, stunningly brilliant dance feature. Cyd Charisse, Moira Shearer and Zizi Jeanmaire interpret with verve and imagination a quartet of droll and dramatic stories that range from the fiery passion of CARMEN to the irresistible zest of the DIAMOND CRUNCHER; from the lyrical magic of CYRANO de BERGERAC to the bubbling sophistication of A MERRY MOURNING. As conceived and also danced by Msr. Petit, the ballets are refreshingly different and performed with great style. The sets are brilliant--full of theatrical daring and splash. The technicolor is dazzling and is used with great wit and audacity. This spectacular use of color and imaginative set design as a background to the eloquent movement and superb technique of the dancers provide a feast for the eyes and make for enchanting entertainment. The inimitable Maurice Chevalier provides the introductions and interspersed narration with his usual gallic charm.
