TWO AMBASSADORS TO SPEAK

Two ambassadors to the United States---from India and from West Germany---will speak at convocations at the University of Alaska Sunday and Monday.

Ambassador B. K. Nehru of India will speak at 4 p.m. Sunday in Schaible Auditorium.

Ambassador Heinrich Knappstein of West Germany will speak at 8 p.m. Monday, also in Schaible Auditorium. He will discuss: "A New Approach in German Foreign Policy."

Both convocations will be open to the public as well as to all university faculty, staff and students.

A-67 TO HOST UNIVERSITY FOR A DAY

University of Alaska Day will be celebrated at the A-67 centennial site Sunday, July 30.

All university personnel---regular and summer faculty, staff and students and their families will be admitted to the site free for the day. The site also will be open to anyone attending any workshop, institute, seminar or special program at the university at that time.

Big event of the day will be a GIANT picnic in the A-67 picnic area in Mining Valley. The big feed will begin about 5 p.m. Families, couples, singles (dogs and cats?) are requested to bring their own picnic lunches. Tables and some fireplaces will be provided.

Liquid refreshments (and more lunch) may be obtained at any concession on site.

Free admission to the A-67 site will be granted to any person wearing a special name tag. These tags will be available after 8 a.m. Wednesday, July 26, in the offices of University Relations and News Service, Rooms 103 and 104 of the Bunnell Building.

All members of each family will be asked to wear a tag.

WICKERSHAM BIBLIOGRAPHIES AVAILABLE

Copies of Judge James A. Wickersham's "A Bibliography of Alaskan Literature 1724-1924" are again on sale at the University Library.

Published in 1927 by the Alaska Agricultural College and School of Mines through a grant from the 1927 Territorial Legislature, the book has been hailed by many experts as the authoritative Alaskan bibliography. It has been out of print and unavailable for a number of years.

University library employees recently discovered a number of copies of the book while moving the contents of a warehouse in preparation for construction of the new Library, Humanities and Fine Arts Center.

The remaining books will be sold at \$15 a copy by the library. Proceeds from the sale will go to the library under the terms of the 1927 grant.

TALK ON GRAMMAR SET
