## Alleged Shooter in Lemon Creek Correctional Facility

Over the 4<sup>th</sup> of July weekend there was an attempted shooting near the Juneau campus. No one was injured during the shooting. The alleged shooter is a man who spent time in the Egan Library and goes by the name David Allen Corwin a.k.a. David Allen White. Mr. Corwin is in jail on \$25,000 bail and can only be released to a third-party custodian. It is not predicted that he will make bail or find a custodian. The DA's office will notify UAS, in the unlikely event that he is released. There has been a Criminal Trespass Warrant issued and Mr. Corwin has been notified that his return to campus will result in serious legal consequence.

## Bartlett Hospital, JDHS and UAS Working Together

UAS Health Sciences is part of a collaborative effort with Bartlett Hospital's Human Resource Department and the JDHS Health Program. The group has submitted grant proposal to the federal HRSA program called "Adopt-A-School" which seeks to increase exposure of entry-level students to the hospital work environment and related healthcare careers. ## REU Spotlight: UAS Hosts Visiting Research Students

UAS is currently hosting nine undergraduates from colleges such as Duke University and Western Washington University for the Research Experiences for Undergraduates program. Students team with UAS, and UAF Fisheries faculty to conduct scientific research projects. Students have already traveled to the Artic and attached video cameras to ringed seals and will be conducting research throughout the summer on the bats of Southeast, the effect of the Valdez oil spill on zebra fish, and ongoing research on marble murrelets and deep sea crabs.

Alison Gould is a double major in Math and Biology with a specialization in Conservation, who said she specifically likes Marine Science and Conservation. She plans to graduate next year from UVI. She is doing research on neptunia with Chris Sedan of UAF. She has been SCUBA diving in 35- 45 ft. of 43-degree water to observe the movement behavior of the fist-sized snails.

This is Alison's first time in Juneau and she had this to say about cruising the Inside Passage on her first day in town. "Just being out in the ocean and seeing the mountains was just unbelievable. I have never seen the snowcaps that drop off into the bay. It was just amazing. And then I looked over and I saw a whale, and then seals and sea lions! It was just too much going on. I even did not know what to think. It was just beautiful."
