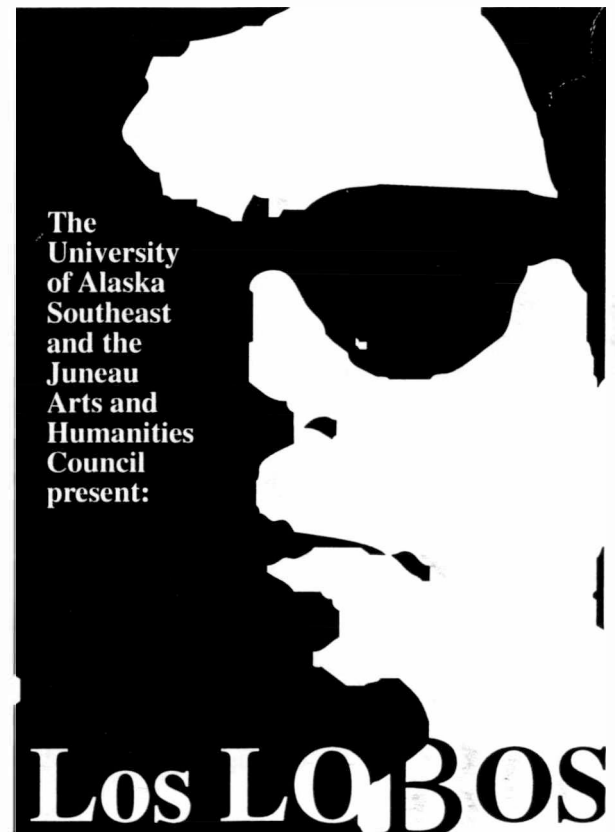

Tickets are on sale now at the UAS Cashier, Hearthside Books and Big City Books. The prices are \$25 in advance, \$28 at the door and \$20 for full-time students from UAS and Juneau-Douglas High School.

Los Lobos plays a wide variety of music and styles and has often won critical acclaim for its albums. The band's hits include LaBamba and Come On Let's Go, recorded for the soundtrack of the hit movie "LaBamba."



## Program assessment update: Regional Committee reviewing recommendations

A regional committee has begun reviewing recommendations of campus program assessment review committees that evaluated the budgets and effectiveness of various UAS programs.

The regional committee's work represents one step in a lengthy program assessment process involving the entire University of Alaska system and that is expected to culminate in a December report by University of Alaska President Jerome Komisar to the Board of Regents.

The UAS Regional Assessment Committee will be advising Chancellor Marshall Lind on possible reallocations and reductions of financial resources that have been recommended by various campus committees. Lind asked the committee to complete its review this week.

The committee is chaired by Bill Thomas of Ketchikan, a member of the UAS Ketchikan Advisory Council.

### National Park Services recognizes Sitka program

The importance of the UAS Sitka Maintenance Worker Training Program was recognized by the National Park Service an interagency council meeting held in Sitka on October 21.

In a letter ready by National Park Service Superintendent Gary Gauthier, UAS was commended as meeting "current and future requirements" for a community-based facilities maintenance and operations training network.

Superintendent Gauthier presented a framed print of Byron Birdsall's painting of the Russian Bishop's House's to Mary Lauer, director of Sitka's Continuing Education Program. He noted that the painting was appropriate because the historic building is affectionately known by the NPS as "our maintenance nightmare."

Included in the UAS Maintenance Worker Training Program are certification classes in hazardous materials response, refrigeration, boiler maintenance, uniform building codes, asbestos abatement, confined-space entry, hazardous painting, key systems and fire extinguisher certification.
