"Impressed" seems to be the word from a team of statewide university leaders who toured the University of Alaska Southeast recently. The team visited campuses in Juneau, Sitka and Ketchikan to review the progress that each campus is making toward becoming a single integrated institution. Bob Warren, vice president for Human Resources, reported that he, and members of the visitation team, were "favorably impressed with the progress toward the goal of an integrated institution. Students, faculty and staff are working together, they are enthusiastic about the task and feel that, with the excellent leadership, the restructuring will offer significant improvement for the communities and the campuses that serve them." Warren noted that financial issues particularly dealing with budget reductions are of major concern. The visit came almost exactly a year from the announcement of the restructuring plan. Other members of the team were President Don O'Dowd, Don Behrend, Sherman Carter, Bill Kauffman, Wendy Redman and Brian Rogers.
