

Retention numbers UP: Encouraging enrollment trends are matched by positive numbers in retention of first-time, full-time (FTFT) freshman students between FY17 and FY18. Retention improved from 58% in FY17 to 70% in FY18. As with recruitment efforts, this improvement in student retention reflects the work of many to keep students positively engaged into their second year and beyond.

Retention, retention, retention: Retention remains a top priority as we continue into the fall semester. We need to do all we can to provide engaging academic offerings, use Early Alert and student support services to help students who may be struggling, and help students access resources. This is essential not only for freshman, but for all students.

<u>Celebrating the new UAS Maritime Training Center:</u> On September 12 I had the privilege of joining UA President Jim Johnsen and our Ketchikan Campus faculty and staff in celebrating renovation of the UAS Maritime Training Center. The event attracted more than 100 participants in the Southeast Conference Annual Meeting, highlighting UAS marine and maritime-related programs that meet the needs of our region. The newly-renovated facility includes a new marine transportation simulator, a Power Technology shop for the Maritime and Multi-skilled Worker program, and a new Welding lab. President Jim Johnsen came away very impressed by the enthusiasm and talents of faculty members Dale Miller, Larry O'Loane, Mariah Warren, Neil Nickerson, Mike LaBarge, and Ken Horn.
